Dear Head Teachers,

Thank you for all the hard work that you have been doing to prepare your schools to receive children back for what must be the strangest of half terms. I am aware that many of you have been keeping your schools partially open for the children of key workers and I am enormously grateful to you and your staff for all that you have done. As children begin to return to schools in larger numbers, I know how much planning and organisation has had to go into making sure that you are keeping the children safe while caring well for your staff.

This is desperately important. Our schools serve some of the neediest communities in the capital. Even those who are less deprived have faced enormous disruption to their education. Many of our most vulnerable young people are at risk of being seriously put back by the interruption to their regular education. I know one Year Six teacher who has told me that the children who have returned to her class are unmistakeably behind; and this is despite the fact that they have been engaging with the online lessons which she has been providing during the first half of term.

The education we attempt to offer in our schools seeks to enable children to flourish with life in all its fullness. (John 10.10) The lockdown has diminished our life together so that even more than before our children need to learn the deep lessons of how to be wise in the ways of God in a changed world; how to live well together when we are socially distanced and need our communities to function well; how to have hope in the face of the disease of this world; and how to continue through everything to show dignity and respect to others in a world whose inequalities have been savagely exposed. The fullness of life in Christ is so clearly needed for us all.

Thank you for all the hard work that goes into this. Please would you pass my sincere gratitude to all those who are supporting your work; both those who are back at school and those who are as yet not able to return. What you are doing is of enormous importance to our young people and to our society.

Jesus said, "do not be afraid little flock." (Luke 12:32) Through all of the ups and downs of this world Jesus supports and cares for all his children. This means that we can have confidence in Him even in difficult times. May you be richly blessed in the work that you are doing. We look forward to the time when our schools can function once again fully. Thank you for all that you are doing now to enable this phased reopening to begin for our children.

NEW BUILD ...

Ealing Fields High School staff and students were delighted to show off their new school building on Monday 29th June 2020. The Prime Minister, The Rt Hon Boris Johnson MP, arrived at 9am and was met



by the Associate Headteacher, Mark Bedford and Senior Project Manager Keith McGinness of building contractor Bowmer + Kirkland.

After meeting Dame Alice Hudson, Executive Headteacher and other representatives of Twyford Academies Trust and the school's local governing body, the Prime Minister was given a tour of the new school by Y10 pupils, who were looking forward to the September 2020 move after spending four years in temporary accommodation.

The Prime Minister visited the restored historic building at the centre of the site then toured the new teaching block – including the café and science laboratories – and saw how well the old and new parts of the school have been designed to complement one another as well as the excellent facilities the school is able to provide for Ealing Fields students. The Prime Minister also talked to staff and students about their experiences of school during lockdown due to Covid-19 and how they have adapted to their online teaching and learning. Representatives of the building contractor were also introduced to the Prime Minister, some of whom have made significant sacrifices to enable work on site to continue in recent weeks.

Mark Bedford, Associate Headteacher said "it was a privilege for Ealing Fields to have this opportunity to showcase the new and impressive school facilities in the final stages of the building project. Our school aims to grow courageous, compassionate leaders of the future and so to start our journey on the new site with a visit from the Prime Minister was a powerful endorsement."

EAST LONDON SCHOOL RE-NAMED...

Earlier this year, 'Black Lives Matter' shone a light on the some of the colonial legacies that still exist in our society, whether they be monumental in nature or by association. In response, the Cass Foundation undertook to review their connection to Sir John Cass, whose personal fortune was made partly through his links to the slave trade. His legacy is mixed, having used this money to support education through the Cass Foundation, but ultimately it was acquired in a way that needs recognition but not celebration or endorsement. In response, the governing body of Sir John Cass and Red Coat Church of England Secondary School took immediate action to remove the statue and bust of Sir John Cass in their school and committed to changing their name, which they argued was at odds with the their promise to support, celebrate and defend diversity, which includes an active commitment to oppose racism in all of its forms.

Following consultation with students, staff, governors, parents, and the community, as well as relevant board committees, the school has been renamed Stepney All Saints C of E Secondary School (Stepney All Saints School).

Stepney All Saints School is still working towards designing a new school logo which will be finalised and agreed upon in consultation with students. It has also pledged to continually review its curriculum to ensure that it is inclusive, progressive and prepares students for the modern world in which they live.

In a shared statement Headteacher Paul Woods and Chair of Governors Angela Hancock, said: "We are proud of our school community and will continue fighting for positive change and providing an outstanding education. We've been overwhelmed by the response, and want to thank everyone for their contribution and patience as we work towards getting Stepney All Saints School ready for September 2020."

Cllr Danny Hassell, Cabinet Member for Children and Schools, Tower Hamlets Council, said: "I welcome the decision of the Governing Body to rename the school and the quick action that it took on this matter. I wish all of the school community at Stepney All Saints Church of England Secondary School the very best for their continued success."

MEDICINE MAN ...

On Thursday 27th February 2020, twenty Y9's from Lady Margaret, Parsons Green set off for a day of creativity, lively discussions and body image centered workshops at the 'Wellcome Collection "Medicine Man" Exhibition'. The gallery contained a vast variety of artifacts from the Victorian era and beyond with individual pieces linked to a specific culture's version of perfection.

They found one section of particular interest which centred around an old Asian tradition, which entailed forcing women's body parts to their absolute extreme, to make them look more dainty or femenine. From the age of 5, Chinese girls would have their toes broken and crushed and bound in thin ropes in order for them to fit into petite tight, shoes. This would cause them to take light, small steps when they walked because of the pain.

They tackled difficult issues and reflected on aspects of their personal lives that can affect their mental health and self-esteem.

HUMANITIES...



Y6 considered if Twickenham was a great place to






















EASTER CELEBRATIONS...

COMMUNITY SUPPORT ...

In May 2020, Alexandra Allan, Headteacher at **The Aldgate School, City of London** was proud to hear on the grapevine that some of the children were involved in community support activities going on locally.

She said, "It really is a testament to yourselves and the school's values that our children want to offer their service and have the confidence to do so. One family that was brought to my attention this week were the Wright family. The 4 family members completed 10 hours of skipping, alternating members every 15 minutes - about 50,000 skips in total. This skip-a-thon was in order to raise money for poor families in Bangladesh via a Hospital called Lamb Hospital. The hospital is taking food packages out to families with no food to eat during lockdown. By the end, they were understandably tired however they have raised more than £1,500 so far".



HOUNSLOW AS ONE ...



HEADTEACHERS MOVING ON / RETIRING...




25 YEARS OF SERVICE...

There was a something about his presence. He could walk into a room and the children would quieten down, without being told to. He loved being/playing Batman!

In July 2017, nearly 300 people filled the pews of St Mary's church in hushed expectation and when John walked in a few moments later, the room erupted into a huge joyous roar, giving him the shock of his life. Parents, teachers and pupils from the 27 years of John's time at the school held the surprise party to wish the retiring head goodbye and good luck for his new life in Australia.

A flabbergasted John took a seat next to a life-size cutout of himself dressed as Batman as people from his past came to pay tribute to him in a "This Is Your Life" ceremony. Finally, with the kind of self-deprecating humour he was famous for, John thanked everyone for "letting him pretend to be a headteacher".
